





GRANDMA J'S STORY...

A few years ago, New England grandma J, received the news that her grandson's parents had been arrested and incarcerated. Grandma J spent no time planning her trip to Frederick, Maryland. She had no idea whom to contact, or what she might find. She did know that she needed to ease the trauma of her grandson's life.

Not long after arriving in Frederick and staying with her grandson in his parents' townhouse, the money ran out. One evening a neighbor found them sitting on the curb. They had been evicted. Grandma J did not know where to turn for help, resources, or a place to spend the night. However, that neighbor happened to be a volunteer with Children of Incarcerated Parents Partnership, COIPP. A call to COIPP's emergency Outreach number and grandma and grandson were soon being driven to a motel. They also received several COIPP gift cards. Grandma J could get groceries and gas for her car so her grandson could continue with some stability in his life by staying in the same school. Eventually, with the help of friends of COIPP, Grandma J and grandson were moved into an apartment. COIPP continued to provide gift cards.

Grandma J's Social Security checks and small Naval pension did not go far in Frederick County, especially with a growing adolescent boy....food...clothes...shoes...repeat.Grandma J and grandson received help, physical, financial, and mental, from the volunteers and board members of COIPP. They were invited to Kids' Activities, and Emergency COVID Giveaways. Grandma J joined the monthly Respite meetings for caregivers where she found women like herself, struggling, but not without hope. At COIPP's Respite meetings caregivers share concerns, stories, resources, and shoulders to lean on. COIPP volunteers led discussions and activities, gave door prizes, and gift cards. Grandson did have to change schools. He has joined the band! He recently told a volunteer he wanted to become a Junior Volunteer FireFighter when old enough. He continues to grow, in many positive ways.


And Grandma J? The struggle continues, but she is not alone. She continues to come to activities, to Respite meetings and has recently become an active COIPP volunteer!

""First and foremost, I want to thank you from the bottom of my heart for your generous donation and for your support to a scholarship that helps break barriers. There is a stigma associated with having parents who are or have been incarcerated. Many think that as a child of incarcerated parents, we have made poor life decisions and will not be able to build a successful life. They may believe that our circumstances will lead us to follow our parents footsteps, to continue the cycle of crime, drug abuse, and "failure". It could turn out that way for some children, not because they inherited a criminal mindset, but because they faced an abundance of stigma from their peers, employers, and doctors. This scholarship helps break stigma and lay a foundation of hope for children of incarcerated parents to build a future they have always dreamed of. I was one to follow the footsteps of my parents and fall into some vey poor decisions, however, I am also one who is now rising above all I had hoped for, working as a Peer Recovery specialist, and beginning the journey to becoming an addictions counselor and social worker. I could never have had this opportunity if it were not for your support and for others who are like-minded, allowing me to see my true potential and live a life my children will be proud of. 
FINANCIAL OVERVIEW
